Highlights from the 2022 American Delirium Society (ADS) Annual Meeting

From June 12 to June 14, 2022, members of the NIDUS II team gathered in Indianapolis, IN for the annual American Delirium Society's Annual Meeting. Those in attendance at this year's ADS meeting included:

NIDUS II Scientific Advisory Board Meeting

On June 12, the NIDUS II Scientific Advisory Board (SAB) met and received an annual update for each NIDUS II core from each leader as well as an annual update from the NIDUS Boot Camp. Members of the SAB, the NIDUS II Investigators, and Drs. Luci Roberts, Molly Wagster, and Susan Zieman from the NIA attended this meeting.

Dr. Sharon Inouye and Dr. Richard Jones began with an overview of NIDUS II. This included NIDUS II's structure, cores, timeline, and benchmarks. Each core leader then gave a progress update for Year 1:

- Harmonization Core Dr. Jones highlighted the new crosswalk/harmonization tool for delirium identification measures on the NIDUS website. He also detailed a harmonization project currently underway with Dr. Miles Berger at Duke University.
- Research Resource Core Drs. Edward Marcantonio and Thomas
 Travison presented the Research Hub, a searchable online delirium
 research tool. They also talked the Animal Research Hub, which launched
 in June 2021.
- Pilots & Exploratory Studies Core Drs. Michael Avidan and Sharon Inouye gave updates on the Pilots Core, which received 20 Letters of

be announced in Summer 2022.

- Career Development & Outreach Core Drs. Jan Busby-Whitehead and John Devlin described NIDUS II's Dissemination network which consists of email, social media, and the NIDUS website. They also highlighted the Core's quarterly newsletters, monthly blog posts, and the delirium webinar series.
- NIDUS Delirium Boot Camp Drs. Devlin and Busby-Whitehead also reviewed last year's Boot Camp and spoke about the upcoming November 2022 Boot Camp.

Statistical Consultation Roundtable for Junior Investigators

Dr. Richard Jones co-moderated a session entitled 'Statistical Consultation Roundtable for Junior Investigators'. Joined by Dr. Elizabeth Colantuoni, PhD (Bloomberg School of Public Health, Johns Hopkins University, MD) and Dr. Michael Harhay (PhD, MPH, Perelman School of Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, PA), the trio invited participants to pose statistical questions in an informal setting.

Moderated by Dr. Luci Roberts (PhD, National Institute on Aging, MD), this session covered the basics of NIDUS II. Dr. Sharon Inouye, one of NIDUS II's two multi-Pls, began with an overview entitled 'What NIDUS II Can Do for You.'

Dr. Richard Jones, NIDUS II's other multi-PI, continued by presenting the NIDUS II Measurement Core: Harmonization of Delirium Measures with recent harmonization updates between the SAGES and Duke INTUIT/MADCO PC Studies. Lastly, Dr. Niccolo Terrando (DREAM Group, Duke University) explained the NIDUS II Animal Models Working Group.
